Roslyn Junior Firefighter Justin Ehly Saves His Neighbor's Life

Justin Ehly, 17, woke to the sound of his little sister's frantic voice. Their neighbor was on the ground in her driveway, she said. Something was very wrong.



Justin then and now. From the time he was a little boy, Justin wanted be a firefighter.

Justin jumped from his bed and ran out the door to his neighbor's side. Following the training he received as a Roslyn Fire Company junior firefighter, he checked her pulse. She didn't have one. Justin began CPR, continuing with compressions until the paramedics arrived.

His neighbor had suffered a heart attack that March morning. Thanks to Justin, she is now ok.

"I did my job," said Justin matter-of-factly. "This is what I was trained to do.

Justin decided to become a firefighter when he was still a toddler. At 16, when he was finally old enough, he joined Roslyn Fire Company as a junior. Junior firefighters train and drill alongside other (continued)

"Our fire company is very family oriented, and I was invited to family gatherings and welcomed to spend time at the firehouse," she remembers. She started going to the firehouse to use the gym, but the more time she spent there, the more she wanted to get in the action, too.

"It seemed interesting, and Sean was having fun, so I thought why not give it a try?" said Jen, who works as a respiratory therapist at Penn Presbyterian Hospital.

firefighters, learning skills from first aid and CPR to how to safely climb ladders and operate a fire hose. When he turns 18 next spring, he will complete the course that will make him a full firefighter.

Justin and other juniors make a huge difference right away. While they cannot enter a burning building, they respond to emergency calls, ride the fire truck or rescue vehicle to fires, accidents, and other emergencies. They support firefighters on the scene. And, as Justin demonstrated this spring, they save lives.

Justin encourages other Abington residents to volunteer. "It's the best decision you'll ever make," he said. "I get to help people and serve the community, and I get to have a lot of fun while I'm doing it."

Jen's career and her volunteer profession both put her in places others might fear. But Jen said her training and protective gear keep her safe while she helps others. "As I tell my patients, no one wants the train accident to happen, but if it does, I'm honored to be there to help."
