WHEREAS, Audubon Pennsylvania has created Bird Town to encourage municipalities to educate their residents, schools, and businesses about birds; and


WHEREAS, the citizens of Abington Township desire a healthy life that includes sustainable green space for the people, plants, and wildlife of future generations; and

COMMENTS

The Township is currently considering entering into a maintenance and contribution agreement with the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation for the Noble (611) Bridge Replacement Project. One of the requirements of this agreement is the Local Municipality have a written Business Integrity Policy in place.

ABINGTON TOWNSHIP BUSINESS INTEGRITY POLICY

It is essential that any contract entered into and/or business conducted by Abington Township (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Township") observe high standards of honesty and integrity. All Township parties must conduct themselves in a manner that fosters public confidence in the integrity of the Township procurement process.

In furtherance of this policy, the Township institutes the following:

- 1. The Township shall maintain the highest standards of honesty and integrity during the performance of any business contract and shall take no action in violation of state or federal laws or regulations or any other applicable laws or regulations, or other requirements applicable to Township or that govern contracting with any party.
- 2. The Township, its affiliates, agents and employees shall not influence, or attempt to influence any employee to breach the standards of ethical conduct set forth in the *Public Official and Employees Ethics Act*, 65 Pa.C.S. §1101, et seq., the *State Adverse Interest Act*, 71 P.S. §776.1, et seq., and the *Governor's Code of Conduct, Executive Order 1980-18*, 4 Pa. Code §7.151, et seq., or to breach any other state or federal law or regulation.
- 3. The Township, its affiliates, agents and employees shall not offer, give, or agree or promise to give any gratuity to an official or employee or to any other person, the acceptance of which would violate the *Governor's Code of Conduct, Executive Order 1980-18*, 4 Pa. Code §7.151, et seq., or any statute, regulation, statement of policy, management directive or any other published standard of the Commonwealth.
- 4. The Township, its affiliates, agents and employees shall not, directly or indirectly, offer, confer, or agree to confer any pecuniary benefit on anyone as consideration for the decision, opinion, recommendation, vote, other exercise of discretion, or violation of a known legal duty by any official or employee whom the Township is engaging in business with or entering into a contract with.
- 5. The Township, its affiliates, agents, employees, or anyone in privity with the Township shall not accept or agree to accept, from any person, any gratuity in connection with the performance of work under any contract, except as provided in the contract.
- 6. The Township, its affiliates, agents and employees shall not disclose to others any information, documents, reports, data, or records provided to, or prepared by, Township under any contract without the prior written approval of the contracting party, except as required by the *Pennsylvania Right-to-Know Law*, 65 P.S. §67.101, *et seq.*, or other applicable law, or directed by a court or other tribunal of competent jurisdiction, or as otherwise provided in any Township contract. Any information, documents, reports, data, or records secured by the Township from the contracting party or a third party in connection with the performance of this contract shall be kept confidential unless disclosure of such information is:
 - a. Approved in writing by the contracting party prior to its disclosure; or

- b. Directed by a court or other tribunal of competent jurisdiction; or
- c. Required for compliance with federal or state securities laws or the requirements of national securities exchanges; or
- d. Necessary for purposes of Township's internal assessment and review; or
- e. Deemed necessary by Township in any action to enforce the provisions of this contract or to defend or prosecute claims by or against parties other than the Commonwealth; or
- f. Permitted by the valid authorization of a third party to whom the information, documents, reports, data, or records pertain: or
- g. Otherwise required by law.
- 7. When a contractor or anyone in privity with the Township has reason to believe that any breach of ethical standards as set forth in law, the *Governor's Code of Conduct*, or in these provisions has occurred or may occur, including but not limited to contact by a contracting officer or employee which, if acted upon, would violate such ethical standards, the contractor or person in privity with the Township shall immediately notify the Township in writing.
- 8. For purposes of the Abington Township Business Integrity Policy, the following terms shall have the meanings found in this Paragraph 8.
 - a. "Confidential information" means information that a) is not already in the public domain; b) is not available to the public upon request; c) is not or does not become generally known to the Township from a third party without an obligation to maintain its confidentiality; d) has not become generally known to the public through an act or omission of the Township; or e) has not been independently developed by Township without the use of confidential information of the Commonwealth.
 - b. "Consent" means written permission signed by a duly authorized officer or employee of the Commonwealth, provided that where the material facts have been disclosed, in writing, by pre-qualification, bid, proposal, or contractual terms, the Commonwealth shall be deemed to have consented by virtue of execution of this contract.
 - c. "Township" means the Township of Abington, including those directors, officers, partners, managers, and owners who may enter into contractual and business relationships on behalf of the citizens of Abington Township.
 - d. "Financial interest" means:
 - (1) Ownership of more than a five percent interest in any business; or

- (2) Holding a position as an officer, director, trustee, partner, employee, or holding any position of management.
- e. "Gratuity" means tendering, giving or providing anything of more than nominal monetary value including, but not limited to, cash, travel, entertainment, gifts, meals, lodging, loans, subscriptions, advances, deposits of money, services, employment, or contracts of any kind. The exceptions set forth in the *Governor's Code of Conduct, Executive Order 1980-18*, 4 Pa. Code §7.153(b), shall apply.
- f. "Immediate family" means a spouse and any unemancipated child.

ROSLYN REVITALIZATION 2015 TDBANK GREEN STREETS GRANT



BACKGROUND AND GOALS The Abington Township Shade Tree Commission (STC), in partnership with The Pennsylvania Horticulture Society (PHS), township staff, and the owner of the Roslyn Valley Shopping Center have been awarded a \$20,000 TD Bank Green Streets Grant to enjoy pedestrian enjoyment and safety by planting trees that serve to connect, beautify educate and divert stormwater runoff. This is the second step towards implementing the Roslyn Revitalization plan, following the Pennsylvania Community Forest MTRP grant of \$5,500 for planting appropriate trees in the vicinity of power lines.

A sequence of three planting areas will form a green corridor that connects residents, park and shopping. From north to south these are: 1. residential streets north of Grove Park near Nylsor Avenue; 2. Grove Park; and 3. the north end of the Roslyn Valley Shopping Plaza at Woodland Road. This project will integrate and complement plantings proposed for the MTRP project, which extends further south into the Roslyn Valley Business District.

The goals of this project include community outreach and education as well as the planting itself. PHS and the STC will partner in volunteer recruitment and training necessary to successfully plant and care for the trees. TD Bank employees will assist township staff and volunteers to complete 2 major planting projects.

PROJECT TIMELINE The major milestones for this project are listed below. Acceptance of funds must be completed by March 16, 2015. The proposed project must be completed and a final accomplishment report submitted by November 30, 2015.

Kickoff at Grove Park- April 25, 2015 (Press release 4 weeks in advance- by March 28, 2015)

- Annual Township Arbor Day proclamation
- DCNR Award of Abington Township's 8th year as Tree City USA accompanied by the 4th year Growth award
- · Planting of trees within Grove Park, including the education circle and demonstration bare root trees
- Volunteer recruitment to register for training and support the major fall planting project
- 2nd Annual watercolor workshop

Outreach- spring and summer 2015

- Place door hangs in the residential area to offer free trees
- Recruit volunteer groups to train and support fall planting

PHS Tree Tenders® training-fall 2015

- This hands-on tree care training will be offered free of charge to volunteers for this project

The Arbor Day Foundation will issue a refund check in the amount of \$20,000 to Abington Township upon project completion and submission of final report and completed W-9 form. PREVIOUS ACTIONS

The Board approved the hunt in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2011, 2012, 2013, and 2014.

RECOMMENDED BOARD ACTION

Motion to approve controlled hunts in the Karebrook Nature Study Area by Abington Deer Management for the entire season from September 19, 2015 to January 23, 2016. Signs will be posted along the perimeter of the area noting that the area will be closed inclusively for the dates noted above.

COMMENTS

The Bureau and the Abington Deer Management organization had a successful season last year and removed 6 deer from Karebrook. Deer vs car accidents along this stretch of Valley Road are still high. The Bureau is recommending that the controlled hunt be scheduled again for this coming season. All ADM hunters will follow the PA Game Commission rules and regulations as well as the guidelines detailed in the Commissioner's letter. Hunters from Abington Deer Management will be parking their vehicles in the wastewater pumping station on Valley Road. Each ADM vehicle will have an ADM sticker displayed on it. At the mid-point of the season, the Director of Parks and Recreation will file a report on the number and type of deer taken out of Karebrook. The dates for the proposed hunt has not been formally adopted by the PA Game Commission. They expect to adopt the dates at the April meeting.

Valley Road Deer/Vehicle Accident Statistics 2011 to 2014

There have been seventeen Deer related incidents on Valley Rd and on it adjacent roadways, from June 2010, through June 2011. There were twenty-two Deer related incidents on the same roadways, from June 2011 through June 2012. Although these numbers alone do not appear significant, a similar increase in Deer related incidents has occurred in Abington Township on many of its roadways. The total number of Deer related accidents for Abington Township for the calendar year of 2012 was one hundred and nine. This alarming number was an increase of forty percent, thirty Deer Related Accidents over the previous year, Seventy-nine. It is in the opinion of the Animal Control Officer that the Deer Management program at Karebrook is effective at maintaining a manageable number of Deer in that area, but because of the growing Deer population in the surrounding areas it will be difficult to recognize its impact. It is also in the opinion of the Animal Control Officer that the Deer management program continues at Karebrook and expands throughout the Township.

The locations and numbers below reflect the Deer related Incidents, on, and adjacent to, Valley Rd. Listed are the Deer related incidents that occurred between June 2012 through June 2013, and June 2013 through June 2014.

The twenty Deer related Incidents for 2013 are higher than desired. The continual growth of the deer herd, and its travel across and about Valley Rd continues to be an imminent risk of injury and life to drivers of the Karebrook area. The existing "Karebrook Hunt" appears to be controlling the herd, by not permitting the herd to grow to an unmanageable size.

The seventeen Deer Related incidents for 2014, is on target to reach the trending numbers for 2011, 2012, and 2013. These numbers indicates that the "Karebrook Hunt" is necessary to manage the existing Deer problem.
