SIGNS; NO PARKING HERE TO CORNER; PARKING PROHIBITED EXCEPT
CERTAIN HOURS; NO STOPPING OR STANDING”
SECTION 27 – “PARKING TIME LIMITED”**

WHEREAS, the Township of Abington is a Township of the First Class, duly organized and existing pursuant to the applicable laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1502.44 of the First Class Township Code of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 53 P.S. §56544, the Board of Commissioners has the authority to enact and amend provisions of the Abington Township Code (“Code”) at any time it deems necessary for the health, safety, morals, general welfare, cleanliness, beauty, convenience and comfort of the Township and the inhabitants thereof; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1502.10 of the First Class Township Code of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 53 P.S. §56510, the Board of Commissioners has the authority to take all needful means for securing the safety of persons or property within the Township; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 1502.49 of the First Class Township Code of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, 53 P.S. §56549, the Board of Commissioners has the authority to regulate parking; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington has determined that Chapter 156 – “Vehicles and Traffic,” Article II – “Traffic Regulations,” Section 14 “Stop Intersections,” and Article III – “Parking Regulations,” Sections 25 “Parking Prohibited At All

Times; No Parking Between Signs; No Parking Here To Corner; Parking Prohibited Except Certain Hours; No Stopping Or Standing” and 27 “Parking Time Limited,” should be amended for the health, safety, morals, general welfare, cleanliness, beauty, convenience and comfort of the Township and the inhabitants thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington does hereby ENACT and ORDAIN as follows:

- Chapter 156 – “Vehicles and Traffic,” Article II – “Traffic Regulations,” Section 14 – “Stop Intersections,” shall be amended to repeal the following restrictions:

- Chapter 156 – “Vehicles and Traffic,” Article III, “Parking Regulations,” Section 25 – “Parking Prohibited At All Times; No Parking Between Signs; No Parking Here To Corner; Parking Prohibited Except Certain Hours,” shall be amended to repeal the following restrictions:


6. All other ordinances, portions of ordinances, or any section of the Code inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.



\$ 10,000 necessary for the project's success.



Whereas, it has been determined that the proposed changes and revisions to the FY 2011, FY 2012, FY 2013, FY 2014, and FY 2015 CDBG Program are a substantial amendment and the Township's Citizen Participation Plan has been followed.

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, as follows:

Section 1. The amended FY 2011, FY 2012, FY 2013, FY 2014, and FY 2015 Annual Action Plans are approved as presented, and as shown in the budgets for each program year which is attached and marked EXHIBIT "A."

Memorandum of Understanding for the Crest Manor Housing Project

Commissioner Spiegelman made a MOTION, seconded by Commissioner Jones to approve the Township of Abington executing a Memorandum of Understanding with other cooperating governmental agencies for the proposed Crest Manor Housing Development. The Township will serve as the lead agency and will coordinate all project reviews for the completion and compliance with an Environmental Review.

Commissioner Kline said Mr. Strother's position within the Township is to administer the Community Development Block Grant funding that the Township receives from HUD and those funds will go towards Crest Manor, and part of that funding pays for his position.

Mr. Strother added that the Township has an obligation for oversight and management of annual funds received from HUD, so whether this project exists or not, he has the same responsibilities to perform.

Resolution No. 15-040 – Economic Development Multimodal Transportation Fund Program

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington desires to request a Multimodal Transportation Fund Grant in the amount of \$1,400,639.10, from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation ("PennDOT"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington intends to use the grant funds for the purpose of purchasing 1100, 1102, 1104 and 1106 Old York Road, Abington Township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, in order to support the vision of the Old York Road / Susquehanna Road project, which will address the demolition, alignment and reconstruction of the intersection of Old York Road and Susquehanna Road, enhance traffic flow, and provide better access in turning onto Old York Road ("project"); and

WHEREAS, the total project costs associated with the above referenced project are approximately \$2,000,913.00 and the Board of Commissioners seeks to obtain the maximum financial assistance available for the project; and

WHEREAS, the Program Guidelines of PennDOT require the receiving municipality to match the financial assistance under the Multimodal Transportation Fund in an amount not less than 30% of the amount awarded, or \$600,273.90; and


WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington desires to designate an official to execute all necessary agreements and documentation related to the grant.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of the Township of Abington, Montgomery County does hereby request a Multimodal Transportation Fund grant of \$1,400,639.10 from the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, representing 70% of the total project costs of \$2,000,913.00, to be used for the purpose of purchasing 1100, 1102, 1104 and 1106 Old York Road, Abington Township, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, as well as the demolition, alignment and reconstruction of the intersection of Old York Road and Susquehanna Road.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Abington township does hereby designate Wayne C. Township Treasurer Jay W. Blumenthal reported for the month of October 2015, the Tax Office deposited \$677,565 to Republic Bank from various Township departments representing a decrease in the amount of (\$599,179) over last year; YTD \$15,661,695 representing a decrease in the amount of (\$891,902) over last year.

As of October 2015, the Tax Office collected \$16,693 in real estate taxes representing a decrease in the amount of (\$13,888); YTD \$25,509,548 leaving a balance to be collected in the amount of \$838,316.

Said certification will cover the current tax year plus previous three (3) tax years.

Commissioner Luker asked for any comments from Commissioners or staff. There were none.

Commissioner Luker asked for any public comments.

Lora Lehmann, 1431 Bryant Lane, asked for the amount that the Tax Collector receives yearly for tax certifications, and she also asked what the Tax Collector's salary is.

Solicitor Clarke replied that information can be obtained through a "Right To Know" request.



NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners of Abington Township does hereby increase the fee to be charged pursuant to Ordinance No. 1934 by the Office of the Treasurer for providing real estate tax certifications from TEN DOLLARS (\$10.00) to THIRTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$35.00) per certification and an additional FIVE DOLLARS (\$5.00) for an expedited certification, beginning January 1, 2016. Said certification will cover the current tax year plus the previous three (3) tax years.

Commissioner Luker asked for any comments from Commissioners or staff. There were none.

Commissioner Luker asked for any public comments. There were none.

MOTION was ADOPTED 14-0.

PENSION COMMITTEE:

Pension Investment Consulting Services

Commissioner Hecker made a MOTION, seconded by Commissioner Sanchez to enter into agreement with the PFM Group to act as a full-service investment consultant to the Township's pension plans, effective November 13, 2015.

Commissioner Luker asked for any comments from Commissioners or staff.

Commissioner Hecker thanked Director of Finance, Kevin Barron, Jeannette Hermann and Township Manager LeFevre as well as Pension Committee members, Officer Chris Posey, Tim Clark and Tim Zurybida along with Commissioners Kline and Sanchez as this motion is a result of months of investigation leading to a point of changing fund managers for the Township's Pension Fund.

The committee came to the conclusion after several meetings during the course of the year that the performance of the pension fund was not up to benchmark, so we decided to investigate what our options were. We consulted with County reps and decided to send out an RFP and received 14 applications and interviewed four companies. The end result of that process was a recommendation to the full Board to enter into an agreement with PFM Group.

By signing this agreement, the savings to the Township's Pension Fund will be over \$400,000 a year in fees. While that is not money that can be used to offset general fund deficit, it does mean that we will not have to dip into the Fund Balance to meet Township's obligation to the Pension Fund.

Commissioner Kline said the Pension Fund works from an assumed 7.5% return and a savings of \$400,000 brings our need of return to meet obligations down to 7.1%, which is a huge difference in fund management.

Commissioner Myers noted that she is listed as a member of the Pension Committee and she had to resign from this committee due to a work commitment, and Commissioner Sanchez has taken her position.

Commissioner Luker asked for any public comments. There were none.

MOTION was ADOPTED 14-0.

COMMENTS FROM CITIZENS:

Lora Lehmann, 1431 Bryant Lane, expressed concern about taxes being raised. Also, she feels taxpayers should not pay for economic development and there should be a figure in the budget of what the Colonade cost the Township.

Louise E. Twymann, 1672 Franklin Avenue, congratulated President Luker on his re-election. She asked for Township staff and taxpayers' money to help expedite a "much needed community center to be built in Ward 5."

Raymond Bell, 2076 Parkview Avenue, commented that yesterday was a celebration and recognition of veterans in this country, and he recognized and thanked the families of those veterans.

REMARKS OF COMMISSIONERS:

Commissioner Bowman thanked Judy Lounsberry, who runs the Veterans Grove Committee who takes care of the flag in Roslyn Park. A nice ceremony was held yesterday for Veterans' Day and he thanked Judy and her committee for it.

Commissioner DiPlacido thanked the Tookany Tacony Frankford Watershed Partnership as on Saturday, November 7, 2015 they planted hundreds of trees and shrubs and repaired the entire riparian buffer around Jenkintown Creek in Ethel Jordan Park.

Also, slow down while driving, and "please, drive like your kids live here."

Commissioner Gillespie thanked Commissioner Kalinoski and the North Penn VFW for the wonderful program they put on for Veterans' Day, and there were so many wonderful veterans there. She congratulated Officer Chris Posey and Melissa and Sean Gargan, who won the Commanders Award.

Commissioner Hecker wished everyone a "Happy Thanksgiving," and he also reminded everyone that it can be a difficult holiday for those who have experienced loss. Recently, there was the loss of an important neighbor of Ward 10 over the past week, Bill Carr, who passed away and who was a father to Steven, Christina and Bill and husband to Cindy, who is active in Troop 72. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Carr family and we wish them peace.

Commissioner Jones thanked Mr. Micciolo and his staff for expediting an open project to completion as well as staff of Parks and Recreation Department for the work they did on the entrance at Alverthorpe Park making it safer for residents who cross there.

He also thanked Officer Malloy for his assistance with a situation at the Willow Grove Mall.

He was not able to attend the tree planting event at Ethel Jordan Park, but he was represented in spirit by the children of Richard Allen Preparatory Charter School in southwest Philadelphia.

Commissioner Zappone reminded his residents that on Saturday, December 5, 2015 at 6 p.m. at the Ardsley Community Center will be the Fourth Annual Ardsley Family Day Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony.

Also, he thanked Mr. Matteo and Lauren Gallagher for their assistance with trying to resolve a resident issue.

Commissioner Spiegelman commented that Thanksgiving is his favorite holiday, but it is that time of year when we need to keep special thoughts for those who experienced loss. He wished everyone a "Happy Thanksgiving."

Commissioner Sanchez announced that he will be assisting in a Turkey Drive again this year collecting turkeys and non-perishable foods, which will be held on November 22, 2015 from 2-5 p.m. at the Brownstone at Sunrise of Abington, 1816 Susquehanna Road.

Commissioner Myers commented that a resident spoke at the podium tonight and said, 'this Board on occasion has dishonored her and attacked her integrity.' She for one as well as many other Commissioners on this Board could say the exact same thing that this resident has done to them, not personally, but in the wards that we represent via email, going to door-to-door and making phone calls, so some of us feel that is a two-way street.

Commissioner Kalinoski commented that yesterday, we celebrated Veterans' Day and we honored nine people; three from the Abington Police Department. He wished a "Happy Veterans' Day" to all veterans especially the Vietnam Veterans. On Thanksgiving at noon, we will be serving dinner to veterans who do not have a place to go as well as all First Responders who are working on that day.


